

TCRM OB: When did you join the Organization?

Organization?

GHW: I am the son of an L & N ticket agent, grandson of a Railroad Post Office agent. I've been with the TCRM since the mid 90's, member # 970.

TCRM OB: What was your primary interest or reason for joining?



GHW: While knowing about the rail line out of Nashville by way of the Broadway Dinner Train, I only found out about the museum later on. My dad was a ticket agent in Paris, TN in the late 50's and early 60's, so I had an early pass to the local rail yard and depot. (My first cab ride was in the yard switcher, an EMD switcher; I remember all the glass windows! Couldn't have been much more than 5 or 6.)

My dad had been moving around the West Tn. region for several years, working for the bus lines in Kentucky, Missouri, and Memphis, but he and mom had finally settled in Paris, and after I was born, they stayed put. For me, though, the traveling bone was embedded and in the DNA.

Watching the taillights of the Pan American recede, or even the caboose of leaving freights, left me with an empty feeling of needing to know what lay over that horizon.

I stayed put too, however, finished high school and a few years in UT Martin and Knoxville, but got out on the road, driving for dad's business on regional and local runs, and eventually doing long haul trucking with a friend and then a local cabinet factory. Railroading was always my passion, but I had learned just how much freedom train crews had (close to zilch) so trucking was my way to go.

TCRM OB: Do you have a home layout and what inspired you to build it?

GHW: From early on, there was always some form of railroad in my life, be it a Marx tinplate oval or real life rail yard and locos. Two of my childhood friends had their dad's layout in the basement, and my first big attempt was in our attic on the 4 x 8 sheet of plywood that later expanded to include the entire space. It wasn't a big house, but it was going to be a Big layout!

Later on, when long haul trucking work became somewhat normal with time off between runs, I did manage to create a 5 x 13 HO layout in an upstairs bedroom of our cape cod, and this was a great learning curve, mostly on how not to build a layout! Working on other layouts was also instructional, and I kept mental notes on what was and was not desirable.

When we finally sold our home of 29 years and found a slightly larger house closer to town, we now have the proper room for our hobbies. A well lit room for my wife's genealogy office, a separate garage for my cabinet shop and Studebaker, and an unfinished attic over the two car garage.

The layout I created in this room is the culmination of all I have learned.

I model the NC & St.L from Chattanooga to Bridgeport, Tn. in the transition era, with a second main to represent the Southern RR., which shared trackage rights, and allows much expanded operations. I have about 100 lineal feet of main line, including staging yards and reverse loops.

TCRM OB: How has your interest or participation changed over the years?

GHW: My interest in all things related to railroading has always been a mainstay, and involvement with the TCRM is a natural extension. How could any railhead resist working with a real life streamliner? Not to mention a first rate model HO and N scale operation, free for the offering? (O.K., 35 bucks a year. Big deal) And the 576 project? It doesn't get any bigger than that.

There is no one thing that stands out in my experience with the museum. It has appeal on so many levels....the history, equipment, the train set alone has so much appeal. So many of our riders have shown such enjoyment at just riding for a day... It really gives meaning to my personal love of the rails....that others can share this enjoyment.

TCRM OB: What area of volunteering or activity do you participate in?

GHW: Helping out in the Hobby Shop

TCRM OB: Do you think that you will still be a member in 5 years?

GHW: I cannot see any loss of enthusiasm for the museum. There are always things that can be improved or updated; that is

just natural evolution that any savvy museum accepts and adopts. For now, I intend to continue working in the Hobby shop, and to present my '56 Golden Hawk as part of the experience of being at our museum and



riding our streamliner.

Car hosting has to be balanced with parking duties; working on the HO layout is fun but challenging when I live 2½ hours away. I have been retired from the road for several years, and still don't seem to find all the time I want to dedicate to certain projects, but the TCRM is still big on my entertainment list.

We spotlight long-term members, the foundation of our Museum, and our new members who bring fresh energy, passion and ideas to the group. We look forward to your participation.

SO YOU WANT TO JOIN THE OPERATING CREW? Here's How Submitted by Tim Bebout, B of D Member # 1042

Crew members start as car hosts. This allows a prospective crew member to understand the internal operation of the train set, learn the railroad and stations, get to know the responsibilities of each position in the crew and they coordinate to safely operate a passenger service train.

The train chief, the car hosts, the electrical tech and food service is critical to every trip. It takes time to understand how this all works together and the role each position per

works together and the role each position performs on the train.

Crew member trainees must be at least 18 years old and possess a high level of understanding of mechanical and operating processes.

We follow the Federal Railway Administration (FRA) Code of Regulations pertaining to training.

Additional railroad specific training is also followed. Crew member trainees are expected to assist with the maintenance of the train set on Tuesday evenings and Saturdays. Crew member trainees must be physically fit and able to pass a Department of Transportation (DOT) physical.

Crew member trainees will be required to pass a series of exams including operations, signals, TSA, brake inspections and brake operations.

Crew member trainees will then start training as a brakeman when the assessment is approved and proper testing completed. The training is very involved and the individual is paired with a trainer at all times.

Train service positions are expected to be heavily involved in multiple ways within the entire museum.

The train service positions are the face of TCRM to the RJ Corman Railroad. All rules and regulations must be followed 100% of the time. No exceptions.

Again Congratulations to **Bob Donovan** for completing his training as a Brakeman.

Riding the Rails - Railroad Excursions Member Stories

Riding the Williams to Grand Canyon RR Submitted by Bryan Turner Member # 69



On the day I rode (mid April) we drove through snow on the way to Williams, AZ. During the days at various times there was snow, sleet, rain, bright sunlight and even a thunderstorm in the distance.

The line gains a lot of altitude from Williams to the canyon. Outside of Williams the terrain has a sparse desert appearance with mesas visible in the distance. As the altitude rises greenery appears, and there are large trees in the vicinity of the canyon.

The Grand Canyon Railroad started as a Santa Fe branch, opened in 1901, built to take passengers from the Santa Fe main in Williams, Arizona to the south rim of the Grand Canyon.

Many of the basic coaches were originally Budd Rail Diesel Cars, with flip-over commuter seats

In addition to building the railroad and Grand Canyon Depot the Santa Fe also built the El Tovar Hotel just yards from the canyon. In the early decades the line was very busy, but with the arrival of the auto and better roads (Route 66 came through Williams) the passenger business declined.



Passenger service on the branch ended in 1968 (and only a handful of people rode that last train). There was some freight business then on the line, but that ended in the mid Seventies.

Not all of the accommodations are coach seating

Several companies tried to return the line to operation, but excursions didn't return until 1989.

At one time passenger trains were pulled by an Alco cab unit and steam locomotives were used regularly, but now the steam operations are infrequent and diesel power is provided by F40 locomotives bought from Amtrak and New Jersey Transit.

Memories of Working on the Railroads in Russia – Story and Pictures By Aleks Dmitriev, TCRM Member # 1403

What I liked best about my job.

Today I will tell a couple of examples of situation about what I most liked in my job.

When I worked as the station operator of Zavodskaya station, during each shift there was a train meeting at my station.

Usually, one of the trains stopped at one of the station tracks, and another train passed though the station on another track. On the single track line, one train had to stop at the station. But on this day two freight trains were approaching my station from different directions. One of these trains was 71 cars long, the other freight train was maybe one third shorter. I prepared the routes for each train: the long train to track #2, the short one to track #3. I called each one of the engineers of these trains on the radio and told them that I am accepting them to the station with stop and the departure signal on red.

Of course, I warned everyone at the station about the arrival of these trains over the loudspeaker.

And when both trains at the same time were entering my station, I was on the platform to meet the locomotives of the trains. After the heads of both train passed by me with 3 short whistles (this signal means that the train will stop at the station) I ran back to

my office and looked at the console. After the last car of the short train left the switches, I turned the switches to make the departure route of the long train and turned on the green light on the signal. A couple of seconds after I saw through the window how the train that was moving slowly along track #2 jerked and then began to pick up speed. And very soon its last car left the switches at the other end of the station. I then turned the switches to prepare the departure for the short freight train and turned on the permissive aspect on the departure signal. The short train was still moving along track #3, albeit slowly, but it was moving. And after a few seconds, the second train started to move faster. I went out from the office and checked the tails of the both trains. I was glad – it was good job.

Why it is so important? Because an especially heavy train starting from full stop at 0 mph, it expends rather more energy (diesel or electric) than if the same train was moving at least 1 mph.

Before I tell the next episode let me explain something from my education history.

In 2012 and 2013 I studied in the Railway University and the vocational school at the same time – it was hard time for me. Close to the graduation of the courses of assistant of locomotive engineer for AC electric engine, I had 3 months practice in the trains. I worked with one train crew (engineer and assistant) on the locomotive VL-80S which pulled the freight trains from the big sorting station Agryz to Izhevsk and back. I worked with two men older than me, and they had same first name Valera. We worked good together, and I learned a lot from them.


After graduation we didn't meet again for almost 2 years when I started work as the station master of the Uski station.

At one night when I worked hard (please read one of my previous stories) there was crew change on the freight train and this train crew that I worked with came to my office to check in. We were happy to see each other.

One day I was working in my station master's office, and the station was under control of the train dispatcher. I came to the station operator office (at that moment there was no one at the control console) to take and check some documents. As usual, I looked at the control console and saw the route for the train from Agryz was to the stop at track #1. I checked the computer and saw that this route was for the train that I worked with crew of two Valeras. I saw that there was enough time for this train to make it to the next station to meet with a passenger commuter train, but the train dispatcher didn't want to take any chances. I took the radio and called the engineer of the freight train and asked if they would make it to the next station by that time. He replied: "open it - we will be in time".

I called the dispatcher and assured her that they would make it. And I saw how the green light for this train lit up on the control console. A few minutes later, I stood on the platform with my hand raised and greeted a freight train passing at top speed. Valera also greeted me with a long beep. I was sure that they would arrive on time and at the terminal station Izhevsk they would have enough time to have lunch without haste. Similar situation was pretty often. I loved in my work when trains go






